We are writing to advise you that children from Y1 to Y6 will be studying aspects of Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) in Terms 5 and 6.

We use the Jigsaw PSHE scheme of work for all aspects of PSHE education. We will therefore be teaching lessons taken from this scheme for RSE. Our policy and scheme of work is reviewed annually by governors and staff. The topics for all children in the school in Summer Term are 'Relationships' and 'Changing Me.' Therefore, many of the lessons taught are based around friendships, relationships with family members, growing up and moving on. Below is a summary of topic areas covered by each year group.
